GETS THE

Interchange is here to stay—for the next 12 months at least.

That's the verdict of the Interchange survey featured in the first edition, and also the decision of the Editorial Advisory Committee formed late last year.

80 people recorded their vote in the special "To be or not to be" coupons—overwhelmingly eclipsing any previous Roadlines survey of staff. Most Divisions responded, so it can be regarded as a State-wide survey.

The vote was: 55 for Interchange, 25 for Roadlines. This represents 69% vote in favour of the new paper.

For the 31% of readers who preferred the old Roadlines format, traditional items will continue to appear in each issue. In this edition of Interchange there are the Long Service Awards (Page 5) and pictorial coverage of various Christmas parties.

Divisional Roundabout will naturally continue, along with Senior Appointments and some CRB official information.


At a meeting on 18th January, the Editorial Advisory Committee chaired by Bruce McKenzie decided that Interchange should be given a 12 months' trial period.

The Committee also recommended that where possible photographs appearing in the newspaper should be of CRB staff. Interchange has followed this through and will show more of the Board's staff (See back page).

Although the response to the survey represents a small percentage of the total distribution, it is still an overwhelming response compared with previous surveys.

LETTER FROM MR DONALD-SON TO EASTERN FREEWAY PROJECT EN NEER, GEOFF HUNT - 21S DECEMBER,

On the important event of the opening of the complete section of the Eastern Freeway (Hoddle Street to Bulleen Road) today, on behalf of the Board I would like to congratulate all who have contributed to this engineering achievement.

A 9 km freeway costing 87 million with its 14 major structures and associated works is a large investment of public funds but it also represents the dedicated application of the diverse professional skills of engineers, scientists, surveyors, draftsmen, clerks of works, and not the least the contractors' workforces. All have been involved in some degree and all can derive satisfaction from the satisfactory culmination of five years' work and effort.

Activities in recent months may have cast a temporary and on the completion of the project and the usual ceremonial opening could not be held. However, this does not detract in any way from the credit due to all associated with this major project.

I am sure that the general public will appreciate the benefits which will result from the freeway. While serving its intended purpose of improved road communication (and also providing for a future rail service), it will be of tremendous benefit to the community by diverting through traffic from other streets and roads thereby reducing congestion and the risk of accidents and enhancing the amenity of these areas.

Would you please extend the Board's thanks and appreciation to all concerned, and good luck in meeting the challenges of the next project.

Metro moves to High St.

After a long association with Head Office, Metropolitan Division has finally made the move to go it alone. It will shortly move to 700 High Street, East Kew.

Since 1973 Metro has occupied part of the MRD building, but in that time has become severely congested so the move has had to be made.

Metro is almost self contained at present so the shift to new premises away from the Head Office complex should not be a difficult one. It will have to provide its own plan printing operation and its own telephonist but otherwise the Division is complete.

New public transport map

A State-wide public transport map, detailing up-to-date road and rail passenger services operating throughout Victoria, has been published by the Ministry of Transport.

The new map shows the network of buses that service major country centres as well as connecting interstate capital cities.

On the reverse side of the map all existing VicRail country passenger services, and the metropolitan network, are set out.

The new map retails for 20 cents and is available from VicRail and Victour offices

new aide-de-camp

Andy McGalliard (Assistant Plans & Surveys Engineer) has been appointed honorary aidede-camp to the Governor General, Sir Zelman Cowen.

The appointment is for three years and involves acting as the Governor General's aide in Victoria when the It may also involve representing the Governor General at minor functions.

The Governor General's aide-decamp is virtually a personal assistant who arranges transport matters, advises on protocol and uniform arrangements for service functions and ensures that the Governor General's official duties run smoothly.

Andy McGalliard is not the first Board officer appointed to the position. Bob Handley had the job nine years ago. Colonel McGalliard is Commander of 6 Construction Groups which controls the CRB unit 22 Construction Regiment in the Army Reserve.

Freeway link completed

The four kilometre section linking the Mulgrave Freeway at Dandenong with the South Gippsland Highway at Hampton Park was fully opened to traffic by the CRB in December, 1977.

The \$10 million project included an overpass over the South Gippsland Highway and direct freeway access for traffic to the

Dandenong-Hastings Road.

The southbound lanes and part of the northbound lanes of the link have been open since December, 1976.

BUS SERVICES ON EASTERN FREEWAY

Bus services began on the Eastern Freeway between the City and Doncaster in January.

The freeway bus route cuts normal bus travelling time between East Doncaster, Templestowe and the City by up to 15 minutes. The buses make 46 trips a day-22 in the morning peak and 24 in the afternoon peak period.

19 ENGINEERS JOIN THE BOARD

The first group of newly graduated engineers to join the Board since 1975 started work this month.

Nineteen engineers have joined Traffic Engineering Division, Bridge Sub-Branch, Road Planning Division, Plans & Surveys Division and Metropolitan Division.

They were selected from 333 applicants from every State in Australia.

In the light of the current unemployment situation and reports about the number of highly qualified people out of work, it is of interest to look at the applicants.

The applicants for the Class 1 positions included a graduate with a PhD in Civil Engineering and three with Masters degrees.

For the past few years the Board has not replaced staff who retired or

resigned unless the need for a replacement could be clearly justified.

The last CRB cadetships in civil engineering were awarded in 1973 and all cadets have now completed their studies.

Well, here (pictured below) is what it looks like when a dart is dropped on the balloon.


It's not as dramatic as you may have imagined—but it makes an interesting picture.

57 RECEIVE LONG SERVICE AWARDS

Once again the Board has paid tribute to its long serving staff members.

In December, awards were presented to 57 people who completed 25 years' and 40 years'service with the CRB.

Since 1975, when the awards were introduced, 19 people have received gold awards for 40 years' service and 366 people have received silver awards for 25 years' service.

This time, the Chairman, Mr. Donaldson, presented four men with gold 40-year awards and congratulated them on their achievements. The four were Alby Smith (Syndal), Russell Smith (Benalla), Mac Wilkinson (Plans & Surveys) and Peter Fletcher (Head Office, Accounts Branch).

Russell Smith was employed by the Board as a time keeper in 1937 until he enlisted in the AIF in January, 1942.

After the war, Russ returned to the Board as an Overseer and remained in that position until being reclassified to Superintendent of Works in 1964. Russ retired in August last year.

Alby Smith started with the Board in 1937 as an Assistant Storeman until becoming an apprentice Fitter and Turner in 1939

He enlisted in the RAAF in 1940 and after $5\frac{1}{2}$ years war service returned to the Board.

Since those years Alby has held several positions including Workshop Foreman at Horsham and in 1962 was appointed as Engineering Assistant in Mechanical Sub-Branch. Mac Wilkinson started in 1937 as a Junior Messenger at the Board's South Melbourne Depot.

He became a Junior Draftsman in 1940 and was seconded to work on sealing the Stuart Highway in the Northern Territory in 1942-43. Prior to 1942 he served in the CMF and joined the RAAF in 1944.


Mac returned to Plans & Surveys

BRIGGS' DREGS

Now that you've discovered that wine is good for you, I imagine you've been wondering which wines are best.

To introduce this subject I think a quick look at wine and food compatibility is worthwhile.

Many people will tell you that it doesn't matter what you drink with particular foods, as long as you like the wine. I agree—this is true as long as you don't have taste buds.

As a useful exercise in yuk, try the following test: chew one mouthful of salad tossed with a vinegar based dressing and wash it down with a further mouthful of your favorite wine. When the residue of the first merges with the second, you should end up with a mouthful of vinegar.

Furthermore, there are some types of oily fish which cause red wine to taste steely—like chewing tin cans.


Next time you think the wine you are drinking doesn't go with what you are eating, please remember it may not be the fault of the wine.







When liars and cheats meet on a golf course...

For this edition we take a look at some of the basics of the game.

Golf is the fastest growing participation sport in the world, and to assist the un-enlightened we list a few of the more important facets of the game.

Golf is ...

- A form of work made expensive enough for gentlemen to enjoy it.



Bob Pearson (NAASRA) is Federal Vice-President of the APEA. On the Victorian executive of the association, John Pittard (Advance Planning Engineer) is branch treasurer and member of the Federal committee of management.

The MOA has about 15,000 members in Victoria, of which 1050 are CRB

The APEA has about 5,500 members throughout Victoria, of which the CRB membership of 500 comprises the second largest co-ordinated group in Victoria after the SEC

Charlie Robinson's involvement with the MOA started in 1964 when he was asked to represent the technical area of MOA members (e.g. draftsmen).

He was elected State Vice-President in the recently held elections.

Lin Peterson has been involved in the MOA for several years starting as CRB sub-branch treasurer, then moving to the Victorian Branch Committee of Management and finally was elected to State Vice-President in 1976 and Federal Vice-President in 1977.

Bob Pearson was elected Victorian branch secretary in 1974 and became Victorian branch president three years later.

He is currently also Federal Vice-President (Victoria) - a position he has held since 1974.

Bob was recently awarded a Jubilee Medal for his work with the APEA.

In recent years CRB staff have received several improvements in salary and working conditions.

These have included:

- Classifications Committee
