SHARE A RIDE TO

WORK

A new service to help CRB staff overcome the problem of car parking around Head Office starts in this issue of Interchange.

It's designed to help people who want to share a ride to and from work.

Car parking around the Head Office complex has reached a premium, and sharing your transport has the advantages of easing this situation, being cheaper, and provides a more relaxed journey to work.

Interest in sharing a ride follows a lot of recent discussion about the problem of parking around Head Office.

One person was moved to write a letter to the editor (see Page 4).

Some CRB staff already share rides to advantage.

Deputy Chief Accountant, John Bulman, has shared rides to and from work for 16 years.

He and four other people — from Plans & Surveys, Bridge, Library and MRD — each drive from the Box Hill area one day a week.

He said the introduction of flexitime could have thrown a spanner into the arrangements, but each person tries to work a nine-day fortnight and this usually works out satisfactorily.

He said that the benefits were quite significant, because in that time he would have needed extra cars for the family, and wear and tear would have been greater.

The CRB supports Defence Forces Reserves

The CRB is actively encouraging Australia's Defence Forces Reserves — the part-time component of the Army, Navy and Air Force.

The CRB has joined other State Government instrumentalities and employers in supporting the "Employer Policy Statement" of the State Committee for Support of the Reserve Forces.


The policy statement encourages enlistment in the Reserves, recognising it as a significant and economical method of providing defence forces in peacetime as well as being a valuable addition to employee development within an organisation.

The CRB is one of the largest employers of personnel who are members of the Reserve Forces and sponsors two units of the Australian Supplementary Army Reserve — Headquarters 22 Construction Regiment and 107 Plant Squadron (Heavy). All Supplementary Reserve Units are sponsored by State and Commonwealth Government Agencies.

The units use the civilian skills of engineers, draftsmen, mechanics, plant operators, field and administrative staff to provide a nucleus of personnel trained in military engineering functions.

Volunteers who enlist with the Supplementary Reserve must attend a 14-day camp each year. Members of other sections of the Reserve Forces serve a minimum of 26 days a year, of which two weeks are spent at a camp. Most employers grant two weeks special leave for staff to attend the annual camp or exercise.

The Committee for Employer Support of Reserve Forces comprises a National Executive and State Committees made up of representatives of employers, trade unions, servicemen and other community groups. Its main purpose is to stimulate active support for the Reserve Forces throughout the community, and in particular to encourage employers to adopt policies that will allow their employees to participate in the Reserve Forces.

Big asphalt job on the Hume Freeway

Repair work and final surfacing of the Hume Freeway between Wallan and Broadford started at the end of March.

The application of the final asphalt overlay resulted from the

acceptance by the CRB of two tenders totalling \$2.7 million.

The two contracts for the overlay on the southern half of the freeway and covering both carriageways, were awarded to Boral Resources (Vic) Pty Ltd, and The Readymix Group (Vic) Ltd.


Application of the overlay requires periodic closure of one carriageway at a time, which is necessary for safety reasons.

This is one of the biggest asphalting projects undertaken in Victoria, and after extensive investigation, the Board has decided that carriageway closures were the only way to reduce the risk of accidents for both the travelling public and workmen.

The closures are effected in daylight hours only, and on weekdays. The alternative route for traffic affected by carriageway closures is the old Hume Highway route through the townships of Wallan, Kilmore and Broadford.

Weather permitting, the work on the southern half of the freeway will be completed in early June, and the final asphalt overlay on the northern half of the freeway is expected to be placed during next summer.

The overlay being placed is in accordance with the recommendations of Dr David Croney, the English road pavement specialist who investigated and reported to the Government on the condition of the pavement of the Wallan-Broadford Section of the Hume Freeway.



\$3 MILLION CONTRACT

The Country Roads Board has let a \$3 million contract as part of the Seymour-Avenel project on the Hume Freeway.

The contract, covering 10.8km of freeway earthworks and drainage, has been awarded to the Tasmanian firm of Shaw Contracting Pt. d, of Whitemore.


The contract announced early in April covers the bypass of Mangalore, from the existing Hume Highway, 1987 of Seymour to Hughes Cree at Avenel.

The Seymour-Avenel project includes the Hume Freeway bypasses of Seymour, Mangalore and Avenel. The total length of this project is 27 km and the estimated cost is \$35 million.

The project is expected to be completed by 1983. Other current works on the Hume Free include the 12km duplication of the existing highway between Avenel and Tubbs Hill (due for completion in 1979) and the bypass of Violet Town, all due for completion next year.

At Mulgrave project...

Graffiti has Don in a quandary...



It is not often that a project engineer is called upon to include removal of graffiti into a works program, but that is just what Mulgrave's Don Durant is faced with.

Don is pictured surveying the handiwork of local children on the Stanley Avenue overpass of the Mulgrave Freeway. Building the bridge in advance of earthworks was the nut of the problem, and produced the unexpected contingency.

Don scouted around for quotes for the graffiti job, and found himself (on behalf of the Board, of course) looking at a bill of up to \$4,000, if the graffiti job was done after the earth was removed.

Do it before at less than half the price? Yes, but that leaves the door open for the little blighters to get at the bridge before the earth is removed.

Don, undaunted, has decided to co-ordinate the graffiti removal with the earthworks job, hoping that the timing is tight enough to leave him with a clean bridge.

THE FINAL TOUCHES TO BALLAN BYPASS

The Ballan Western Freeway project is nearly complete. Almost $2\frac{1}{2}$ years after work started the 8.4 kilometre freeway bypass of Ballan will be fully opened to traffic in June.

Over the past few months regular users of the freeway have slowly become acquainted with the new route. Traffic has been using the new pavement at various stages to aid in compaction.

The completion of the \$8.2 million Ballan section is a further step in providing a four lane roadway from Melbourne to Ballarat. Only the 11.2 km Wallace to Bungaree section needs to be built to accomplish this milestone.

The Ballan section features full diamond interchanges at the eastern end and at Daylesford

Road, as well as an overpass at Greendale Road, an underpass at Racecourse Road and bridges over the Werribee River and Eastern Moorabool River.

Once Ballan is complete, work will accelerate on the Wallace-Bungaree section. Service relocation work has already started and the 11.2 kilometres of freeway is expected to be complete in 1981 at an estimated cost of \$12 million.

Work on the project has been done by CRB direct labour except for contracts let for the bridgeworks and minor works such as kerb and channelling.

Luckily the rougher side was chosen; the other side was blocked by trees.



LETTER

The Editor Interchange,

Dear Sir,

Recently, through no fault of my own, I arrived at work at 9.10 a.m. and found every available car parking spot taken, except of course the three locked spots in the south cutting which were completely empty. Faced with the dilemma of where to park my vehicle I remembered that if I parked in Denmark Street, in two hours time I could be fined for exceeding the time limit. I also remembered the Board directive that Section Heads make sure that staff do not leave during office hours to move their vehicles in such a circumstance.

Where then could I park? Should I park in the alcove half way down the south cutting and block somebody in or should I park in what was now the only entry and exit from the alcove, as the other exit was blocked?

I could of course wait in the cutting for somebody to come and move their car for some reason or another, but that could have been lunch time.

I eventually decided to join the other half dozen cars parked "illegally" in the areas reserved for CRB vehicles. During the course of the day a "sticker" was stuck on my windscreen informing me that "employees of the CRB are not permitted to park in this area"— as if I didn't already know.

Eventually at 4.45 p.m. my boss was rung up and asked to ask me to shift my vehicle as somebody could not park a CRB vehicle in the allotted area. This I did.

The point I would like to make is that there is insufficient car parking space available to Board employees.

The solution to this problem could be quite complex if it was let go, but if action was taken now, the solution would be simple. My suggestion is that a register be formed of people who would care to car pool and who can take turns in driving to work. This register could be formed on a location basis so that people can easily get a lift to work in case of an emergency. This method can work with Flexitime as acceptance of car pooling also means acceptance of the driver's wishes for that day/week.

At the same time official approaches either through the Board, HOSA, or appropriate Unions/Associations should be made to the Kew City Council pointing out that the Kew shopping centre receives quite a lot of revenue from CRB employees and should therefore receive special consideration with regards parking restrictions within say a 200 metre radius of Head Office.

If this action is not successful, voluntary restrictions on the use of the High Street shops should be called for until parking restrictions are eased.

GOLF







ARMY UNIT HELPS OUT IN BENALLA

During floods in May 1974, a bridge on the Swanpool Main Road over the Broken River at Swanpool collapsed. The collapsed bridge was an old reinforced concrete structure which was erected around 1916.

The Board's Benalla Division erected a Bailey Bridge over the river to take traffic whilst a replacement bridge was being constructed. The Bailey Bridge was a 100ft long single span "triple single".

The new bridge, a three-span reinforced concrete structure, with prestressed concrete beams, was opened to traffic in 1977, and the Divisional Engineer; Benalla, asked Lt Col Hunt, the Commanding Officer of 22 Construction Regiment, if the Board's unit could "delaunch" the Bailey.

The delaunching was approved by the Army, and a squad of 39 men was assembled on the 17th March, 1978, to carry out the weekend task. Of these, thirty-two were from 107 Plant Squadron (Heavy) and two from Headquarters 22 Construction Regiment, both of which are sponsored by the Board. Five personnel were from 105 Construction Squadron, which is sponsored by the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission.

Some preparatory work was carried out prior to the weekend by members of the unit and Shire of Benalla employees, so that all was in readiness for an early start on the Saturday morning.

All went well, thanks to good maintenance while the Bailey was in use, and by the end of Saturday, the delaunching was completed.




All who attended voted the exercise as successful. It was an opportunity for people from all sections of the Board to get together, and also was a very fine example of Board/Unit cooperation.


HOSA members can buy tickets


