FROM BOARD

IN DECEMBER

The Chairman of the Board, Mr R. E. V. Donaldson, has indicated that he intends to retire from the Board's service on Friday, 8th December,

Mr Donaldson joined the Board's service on 9th September, 1945, and was appointed Board Member on 10th August, 1962, Deputy Chairman on 1st July, 1963, and Chairman on 1st September, 1971.

FUNDS FOR 1978-79

Hume Highway

More than \$17 million will be spent next financial year on the Hume as part of the CRB's program to construct a divided highway from Melbourne to Wodonga.

The money will be used mainly for constructing freeway and divided highway facilities on sections of the Hume from Seymour to Avenel, Avenel to Tubbs Hill and the bypass of Violet Town.

Major areas of expenditure will include construction of the Seymour to Avenel section which will absorb more than \$6 million during 1978-79. The Avenel to Tubbs Hill section has been allocated almost \$2 million while the bypass of Violet Town will absorb another \$2.6 million.

A further major item of expenditure will be the completion of the final surfacing of the Wallan to Broadford section (\$3 million).

The 12 kilometres of duplication from Avenel to Tubbs Hill is expected to be completed by the end of 1979 at a total cost of \$6.6 million, while the Violet Town bypass is expected to be completed at the same time at a cost of \$6.5 million.

The Seymour to Avenel section is expected to be completed in 1983 at a total cost of \$40 million.

West Gate Freeway

CRB expenditure on the West Gate Freeway (F9) will be boosted to a total of \$11.02 million for the 1978-79 financial year.

Included in the project budget for next year will be \$6.2 million for land acquisition and \$4.82 million on construction and association work.

While this represents a significant increase in expenditure over the previous financial year the CRB urgently needs additional funds for this and other major projects, such as the Nepean Highway widening.

The \$6.2 million allocated for expenditure on land acquisition for 1978-79 will bring the total allocated so far for land acquisition to \$10.4 million.

To date, 52 of the 113 properties required have been purchased, and negotiations are under way for 54 others.

The \$4.82 million allocated for construction work \$978-79 will bring the total allocated so far for construction and sociated work to \$6.75 million.

Princes HighwayEast

The CRB has allocated more than \$7 million for construction work on the Princes Highway/Freeway east of Dandenong for 1978-79.

The allocation for Princes Highway work between the outskirts of Melbourne and the NSW border includes work on sections of the Princes Freeway at Moe and Drouin.

Construction work is under way on the Drouin section of the Princes Freeway between Robin Hood and the Princes Highway east of Drouin.

Almost \$3 million has been allocated for this work during 1978-79 with \$2 million of this amount to be spent on road construction and almost \$1 million on bridge construction.

A further \$350,000 will be spent on the construction of a second carriageway on the Moe section of the Princes Freeway, with work on the Watsons Road interchange expected to begin during financial year 1979-80.

On the Princes Highway East between Rankins and Wingan River in the far east of the State, the CRB has allocated \$455,000 for reconstruction work. The four-kilometre project is scheduled to be completed in 1979-80 at a total cost of \$822,500.

In addition, duplication through Trafalgar township at a cost of \$461,000 will be substantially completed.



Womens Training Course

Women members of a trade union can attend a special Trade Union Training Authority course that deals with the problems encountered by women at work and provides an insight into the workings of the union movement.

The Board provides paid leave for women to attend the courses, which are held over periods of up to five days.

The course deals with the history and structure of trade unions, functions of officials, recruiting, interviewing members, meeting procedures, reporting, compensation, conciliation and arbitration and of particular interest to women, occupational health, migrant women, the working women's Charter, women in unions and the Women's Working Centre.

There are visits to the Conciliation and Arbitration Commission and the Women's Working Centre, films and group activities. These are designed to improve the understanding of the role of unions and how they can help women in their work situation.


Actually, the dogs are show dogs. They are owned by Marilyn O'Connor who works at the Johnson Street Office in South Melbourne.







SERVICE MEDAL TO HARRY STAFFORD

Harry Stafford (ex Eastern Freeway) has been awarded an Imperial Service Medal in recognition of 28 years' service with the MMBW and the CRB.



Mr Stafford, who retired in June. 1977, will receive the medal from the Governor, Sir Henry Winneke, at an investiture at Government House later this year.

He is currently enjoying his retirement at his holiday house (pictured).

English-born, Mr Stafford spent 51/2 years' service with the RAF in World War 2. In 1949 he migrated to Australia and joined the MMBW as a carpenter and was sent to the Upper Yarra Dam Project. His active participation in returned servicemen's affairs, youth and sport in this rural area played an important part in the day to day lives of all members of this isolated

His abilities earned him promotion through the ranks to Inspector Class 1 status.

Following the completion of the Upper Yarra Dam Mr Stafford was transferred back to the Melbourne Metropolitan area where he was engaged in the construction of a number of major sewerage and water supply projects.

In 1960, Mr Stafford transferred to the newly-formed Highways Division of the MMBW and was engaged in the supervision of that Board's first major project, the construction of Section 1 of the South Eastern Freeway completed and opened during 1962. Since that time he was involved in many major projects including the extension of the South Eastern Freeway and Tullamarine Freeway.

He was the first senior works inspector to take up duties at the commencement of the Eastern Freeway in 1970 and was in 1972 promoted to the position of Works Supervisor, the highest level of status in this field of employment.

During the period of construction of the Eastern Freeway over the last seven years, Mr Stafford has been involved in many aspects of this varied and complicated project.

Mr Stafford has had a fine record of involvement in major projects that have been brought to successful conclusions.

Would you believe it? The other day I was reading a Board file relating to the intricate financial dealings of Ballarat Division and, voila, inspiration for this column.

I hope "no-one" minds, but I feel that people like Tom Lazar at the Virgin Hills Vineyard at Kyneton deserve a plug for their efforts. (It also enables me to offer a recommendation from somewhere in deepest Ballarat Division.)

When the earliest Australian winemakers began practising their craft they had to contend with climatic conditions previously unknown to them.

As time passed, many poeple began drinking wine and groups such as the CRB Wine Club were formed. All such groups have one common objective — the serious contemplation of oenological

To satisfy this pseudo-monastic attitude towards the grape, the current crop of winemakers have had to keep on their toes in the pressing problem of producing a better product. Enter two champions.

The first is my mate, Wolf Blass. (We've been formally introduced, I'm not just name dropping.) If Wolf is given credit for nothing else, it will be for his sexy wines.

Wolf's wine is sensuous, hot-blooded stuff, that is so well rounded and balanced that it can't help but come across from the word go. His secret is blending and preparation.


First off, he takes some rich, full-bodied cabernet, and blends it with a sufficiently aggressive shiraz. The whole is then allowed to mature in best quality virgin oak. And then! C'est la vie!

The second is the aforementioned Tom Lazar. His first vintage is very different from other Australian reds, in that he has used a grape called Merlot, as well as the usual cabernet and shiraz. The result is a French-style wine.

I believe his experiments with merlot are worth keeping an eye on as they certainly produce a very seductive suppleness in his wine.

One warning. If you decide to visit his vineyard, watch out for the road. Actually you can't miss the road — it's woeful . . . to my car anyway.

Two recommendations, then, this month — Wolf's from the Barossa Valley, and Tom's from Ballarat's own Virgin Hills Vineyard. (Funny name for a vineyard though.)

The men are from Mulgrave, Eastern Freeway and Seymour Projects; and Ballarat, Bendigo, Dandenong, Geelong, Metropolitan and Materials Research Division.

The magnitude and urgency of the job has led to a high level of enthusiasm.

Clerk of Works, John Kennedy (Ballarat) said the work provides valuable experience. "In Ballarat we would place 300 to 400 tonnes of asphalt in a day. On this job we are

Base-course paving on the southern part is complete (approximately 71,000 tonnes). Maximum daily output achieved to date with both contractors is 3700 tonnes.

The best daily production by a single contractor (Boral) is 2600 tonnes, which is believed to be an Australian record.

Placing of the Wearing Course on the southern part has commenced, however, it is expected that there will be a short break over winter and this part of the work will be finished next October.

On site MRD staff led by Pat Brown (Head Office) and Zane Streeter (Ballarat) are testing the asphalt mat for compaction. To date approximately 1000 cores have been cut and tested. By comparison about 200 cores were cut in the Board's total asphalt production for 1976-77.

The site office is located at Wandong, about 54 kilometres north of Melbourne, and for many of the men this means considerable travel to and from work. Others have elected to stay in Bendigo's amp at Wandong.

UNION NEWS looks at two professional associations . . .

AAESDA

The Association of Architects, Engineers, Surveyors and Draughtsmen of Australia is the largest Union in Australia representing Draughting, Technical, Supervising and Surveying employees.

AAESDA's membership is Australia-wide and covers employment in the Australian Public Service, Commonwealth and State Instrumentalities, Universities, Metal, Motor, Ship Building and Aircraft Industries as well as mining areas and other industries.

AAESDA has been established for more than 60 years and has had an area committee established at the CRB since 1962. Elections for the committee are held annually. The membership is entitled to representation on the Victorian Branch Council. Currently Geoff Larkin is a Branch Councillor from the CRB. He is also a Branch Vice-President and Federal Councillor. A former experimental officer with the CRB, Geoff Whitehead, is now an Industrial Officer with the Victorian Branch of the Union.
