
When Tom joined the Board six years ago, he discovered a lifetime secret.

"It was a great surprise. I had never known there was another name," he said.


"All my life I had been known as Tom. I only learnt my proper name when I came here."


SENIOR APPOINTMENTS

Freeway emergency service

Motorists' calls to the Country Roads Board's emergency freeway service have topped 1,000 per month since the extension of the service to the Mulgave/South Gippsland Freeways.

Latest figures show that the new Mulgrave/South Gippsland Freeways service accounted for more than a quarter of all calls during September and October last year.

The service provides 40 emergency telephones, covering the two freeways from Forster Road, Mt. Waverley, to Sommerville Road, Hampton Park. The service commenced at the end of August.

A total of 267 calls, the largest from any of the major arterial routes covered by the service, were received from motorists on the Mulgrave/South Gippsland Freeways during the first month of operation, September.

ANTI - VANDALISM CAMPAIGN

Victoria's road vandalism bill is approaching \$½ million each year, according to the findings of a CRB survey into the problem.

The survey carried out by CRB regional divisional engineers throughout the State showed that direct costs to the Carrier were about \$250,000, and the local government was at least equal to that figure.

The main targets of vandals are signs, guideposts, trees and shrubs, and facilities at wiside rest areas. Emergency telephones are also a target on urban freeways.

Damage to signs is a widespread problem. Many signs are bullet ridden, defaced, torn from their posts, or stolen. Guideposts are knocked over or even chopped up for firewood.

Police prosecution of vandals, together with penalties imposed by the courts and publicity can have an important deterrent effect on the growth of vandalism.

Many cases of vandalism occur during holiday periods at popular tourist locations.

Continued co-operation between motorists, police, the media and the CRB is essential in reducing the wasteful costs of vandalism.

In March last year vandals wrecked five emergency telephones on the Eastern Freeway, temporarily putting the freeway's emergency system out of action. On the Mulgrave Freeway recently three emergency telephone handsets were stolen.

Facilities at rest areas are also hit by vandals. At the Tolmer rest

area on the Western Highway the CRB was required to spend more than \$1,000 repairing facilities damaged by vandals

A recent major case of vandalism to signs occurred on the Maroondah Highway and the Goulburn Valley Highway between Mansfield and Molesworth, where vandals caused more than \$3,000 damage.

Warning and direction signs, guideposts and hazard warnings are erected for the safety and benefit of motorists. Interference with these roadside fittings can seriously reduce the safe conditions provided for the travelling public.

Examples of vandalism committed on roadsides throughout the State are:

- All kilometre plates were stolen from the guideposts on the Great Ocean Road between Lorne and Apollo Bay.
- Guideposts deliberately knocked down.
- In December, 1976, a 40-year-old memorial plaque at the Mt Defiance lookout on the Great Ocean Road was stolen.
- Warning lanterns stolen.
- Fatigue Zone warning signs on the Western Highway were stolen only a few weeks after being erected.
- All glass and perspex parts of a CRB backhoe were smashed while parked at a Ballarat road project over a weekend.
- Traffic counters damaged.
- Toilets, seats and eating facilities at rest areas damaged.

BURKE RD/BRIDGE

A new \$1 million bridge for southbound Burke Road traffic crossing the Yarra River at Kew was opened to traffic in January, 1979.

The bridge provides two lanes for southbound traffic plus a pedestrian footpath.

It is similar to and abuts the existing bridge for northbound traffic, which was opened in 1967.

The new 11 span bridge for southband traffic replaces a lower level bridge constructed in 1926. The old 1926 bridge was subject to flooding and in 1934, was submerged to a depth of 1.5 metres.

ON THE BUSES

WITH CHAS

The Australia Day holiday was a proud day for Charles Craig (6th floor, HO) when his two historic buses took part in the Cavalcade of Transport through Melbourne.

For the past eight years Charles has spent most of his spare time restoring the buses, a 1935 Diamond T and a 1936 Federal.

Both are small capacity buses (16-17 seats) and are typical of the many buses operating in Melbourne suburbs until the early 1950's.

Charles' first bus was the 1935 Diamond T which he bought for \$90 in 1970 after the vehicle had been lying idle in a Brunswick backyard shed for almost 20 years.

"The shell was in good condition but the timberwork had rotted away," Charles said.

Charles stripped back the interior woodwork in the ceiling and then varnished it. Painting and other restoration work has brought it back into near-new condition.

Charles acquired the 1936 Federal bus, which is similar in appearance to the Diamond T.

However, both the Diamond T and the Federal require more work on the engine before they can be driven again.

Charles is a member of the Bus and Coach Society of Victoria, and was actively involved in organising this year's Melbourne Pageant Cavalcade of Transport.



Surveyor Rod Chapman (Head Office) represented Victoria in the Australian baseball championships (Caxton Shied) played in Melbourne in January.


It was the first time that Rod, a centre field player, has played in the Australian championships, although he represented Victoria twice in interstate games in 1975-76.

 Another top baseballer with the Board is Graham Deany (Estates) who has represented Victoria and Australia, and is currently coaching a metropolitan "A" grade team.




A caller rang the CRB for some information about plans for a road project and was informed: "It has not been shelved; we just have not got around to it!"

West Gate Freeway, South Melbourne.

Work is continuing on the 3.6 km West Gate Freeway between Graham Street, Port Melbourne, and Kingsway, South Melbourne. Alterations to the existing freeway between Graham Street and Rogers Street have been completed and were opened to traffic with the West Gate Bridge on 15th November, 1978.

Site clearance is well advanced and construction of 124 of the 416 foundation piles required for the 1.85 km elevated section of the freeway is scheduled to begin in March, 1979.

Cost estimate—\$87 million. Completion expected—late 1983.

NOSTALGIA

CRB patrol work in the 1930s involved pioneering spirit as well as hard work.

Here are some photos from the scrapbook of retired patrolman Joe Gilliland of Warburton, who joined the CRB in 1935 and spent 34 years on patrol in the Warburton area.

Joe recalled his first years on patrol . . . in the days when the patrol trucks had to be hired and

when the men went on a fortnight trip into the mountains issued only with a tent.

He said on a snow clearing patrol in the Great Dividing Range, the final task of the day would be to clear a patch of snow away so that they could pitch the tents alongside the road.

Most of the patrol work in the 1930s was carried out by hand shovel. It was hard work. Often the men would leave their families on a Monday morning and not return from a patrol trip until Saturday afternoon.



Metric time may be on its way to Australia, following the successful conversion to metric weights and measures. To assist Board staff in the event that metric time is adopted, Interchange provides the following information...

These will be 10 seconds to the minute, 10 minutes to the hour, 10 hours to the day and so on, delineated to the following table:

Old Time New Time
1 Second 1 Milliday
1 Minute 1 Centiday

1 Hour 1 Deciday
1 Day 1 Day
1 Week 1 Decaday

1 Month 1 Hectoday
The fortnight will be withdrawn.

Due to the fact than one new hour represents only 5/12ths of an old day, employees might be expected to work longer hours, viz. 3½ decidays (or millimonths) per day; however, as this is convenient for administration and payroll purposes it is intended that luncheon breaks will be shortened by ½ a deciday, thus making a total daily working time of 3.542 new hours, or 2 new hours plus 4 millidays.

It is not expected at this time that any increase in salaries by way of compensation for extra time worked will be made, except in the case of leap kilodays, where an adjustment will be built in at the end of the hectoday every 1.46 decamonths. Overtime will be paid to all employees for the time worked in excess of 5/6ths of a deciday, provided approval from the Department of Labour and Industry has been obtained beforehand.

Pension schemes will not be affected, but superkilodaycation will be adjusted accordingly.

Holidays will be affected only so far as the change to Metric Time is concerned and no one shall be worse off than previously. Thus if any employee was entitled to 22 days (old time) he will now be entitled to 220 Decidays, or one hectoday plus 20 decidays for every hectoday over and above 20 kilodays service since the tenth deciday of the third hectoday of 1954.

The term "a month of Sundays" is not to be used on official documents. The correct term will be "a hectoday of decidays".

If you require more details please do not contact us until next hectoday as the staff are having their 4 decidays leave due under their award.



Last column I criticised French wines for being too expensive. However, when you look at German whites, the value for money considerations are on the purchaser's side.

Furthermore, German wines can be drunk at any time of daybreakfast, morning tea, lunch, etc.

In fact, I can think of no finer way to resume work after the lunch break than with a couple of glasses of white coursing through your digestive system.

Cafeteria please note—nicely chilled white is more salubrious on a hot day than expresso coffee.

Imagine that you are dining on the latest gourmet treat in the caf. Feeling a little parched, you look around for a drink to accompany your repast and are confronted by Board tea or fruit juice drink.

What an ideal opportunity to introduce deliciously refreshing fruity wine into the bill of fare. Instead of losing customers to the local, I could envisage having to make a reservation to dine in the caf.

l've digressed a little, but one of the advantages of German whites is their low alcohol content. Two glasses with lunch would have no more effect on your senses than a cup of Board tea-and would be de ded more pleasant.

Oth D. suitable occasions for drinking are: while watching sport on T.V. (you know—Wine, Be In It); after emerging from the pool on a hot day; and whenever you feel

Naturally enough not all the wines are worth drinking, but there are many pieces de resistance from the Mosel, Saar, Rhine and Nahe Valleys.


The best wines are rieslings. They exhibit an incredible concentrated flavour, reminiscent of lime juice, which makes your palate secrete into action after the first sip.

The only problem with German wines is the foreign (strange this is so) nomenclature.



Medal to 'Mick'


Former Benalla Division overseer Roland "Mick" Mitchell has been awarded the Imperial Service Medal for "meritorious service" with the Government.




The Autograde could save a possible \$30,000 per kilometre of carriageway when compared with the costs of current methods.
