

1979 - 1980 IN BRIEF

PERSONNEL

The CRB employed a total of 5271 people as at 30 June 1980 comprising technological staff (professional) – 625, technical staff – 619, administrative staff – 806, supervising staff (field) – 177, supervising staff (depot) – 77, clerks of works – 71, construction and maintenance personnel – 2243, workshop and depot personnel – 653.

EINANCE

Receipts

The funds available for our expenditure in 1979-80 totalled \$263,861,808.

These funds were derived from:

- State sources \$145,388,834
- Commonwealth sources \$113,630,663
- Balance brought forward from 1978-79 \$4,842,311

Expenditure

Funds expended by us during 1979-80 totalled \$263,599,223 leaving a balance, as at 30 June 1980, of \$262,585.

Municipal Allocations

Victoria's 212 municipal councils were allocated \$90,072,000 for roadworks on main and unclassified roads during 1980-81. We also announced the introduction of a system of "rolling programmes" for allocation of funds to municipal councils as from 1981-82 financial year.

TRAFFIC SIGNALS

The CRB continued the development of the SCRAM traffic signal project (Signal Co-ordination of Regional Areas in Melbourne).

Regional computers were installed in Blackburn and St Kilda to co-ordinate traffic signals on the Maroondah Highway and the Nepean and Princes Highways respectively.

FREEWAY OPENINGS

Five new sections of freeway were opened to traffic by the Honourable Robert Maclellan, MLA, Minister of Transport.

12 Dec 79 Mulgrave Freeway, Forster Road to Huntingdale Road

18 Dec 79 Tullamarine Freeway, adjacent to the western boundary of Essendon Airport.

19 Dec 79 Hume Freeway, Avenel to Tubbs Hill

18 Mar 80 Mornington Peninsula Freeway, Keysborough to Seaford

21 Mar 80 Hume Freeway, Bypass of Violet Town

The total cost of these freeway sections was \$48 m.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE

During the year, our funds were spent on construction, reconstruction and maintenance as follows:

Freeways	\$65.3 m
 State highways 	\$49.8 m
 Main roads 	\$42.6 m
 Tourists' roads 	\$4.0 m
 Forest roads 	\$1.9 m
 Unclassified roads 	\$45.6 m

Bituminous surfacing

We surfaced 5,027 kms of road at a cost of \$39.2 m.

Bridge Construction

The construction of 119 new bridges, estimated to cost \$30.2 m, commenced during 1979-80. Forty-seven bridges were under the direct control of CRB staff, and 72 were under council supervision with financial assistance from the CRB.

Land Purchase

We paid compensation and associated costs of \$17.5 m to purchase land required for new roads and improvements to existing roads.

Contracts

We let four hundred and two contracts worth a total of \$62.4 m.

MAJOR PROJECTS

During the year we commenced or continued work on ten major projects, each costing at least \$4 m.

MANAGEMENT -A TRAINING EXERCISE



JOIN THE PUDDING CLUB

Christmas just wouldn't be Christmas without a pudding, would it? But perhaps you don't relish the thought of tucking into a traditional hot plum pudding on Christmas day.

Well, to help you celebrate the festive season, Australian-style, Interchange now presents an ice-cream Christmas pud recipe. Guaranteed to be delicious, and good-for-you!

ICE CREAM CHRISTMAS PUDDING

1/2 cup cherries, halved

1/2 cup mixed peel

1/2 cup raisins, chopped

1/2 cup sultanas

2 tsp mixed spice 1 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp nutmeg

2 tsp rum or vanilla/2 TBL brandy

21/2 cups cream

11/4 cups icing sugar 4 egg whites

1/2 cup almonds, halved and toasted

2 tsp cocoa

2 tsp hot water

Combine fruits with spice, cinnamon and nutmeg. Pour over rum, etc. and allow to stand overnight. Whip cream stiffly, adding half the icing sugar.

In another basin, whip the egg whites until stiff and gradually beat in the remaining sugar. Lightly fold the two mixtures together.

Add the fruit, nuts and cocoa dissolved in the water. Pour mixture into a foil-lined 2 pint aluminium pudding basin and place in the freezer. Freeze until firm.

This pudding is best made at least three to four days before serving.



Jane Anderson, the only CRB girl to run the Big M, made the distance. In fact, her pace increased during the last 7km along St Kilda Road.



The scene was set for an exciting final after we beat Ambos (Ambulance Brigade) in the second semi-final. This was the first match Ambos had lost in two years.


Our defence, in the first half, was almost non-existent, and Ambos scored with great ease. Both teams made unforced errors and, at half time, Ambos led 18 to 9.

A good time was had by all — which just goes to show that Glen Waverley is a good place to work **and** play!


Glen Waverley depot was constructed during the late 1950s to replace the CRB's original workshop facilities in South Melbourne. The entire Mechanical Division and the Central Stores were transferred to Glen Waverley in 1959.

The depot occupies about 38 acres of land. The actual work carried out there has diversified over the years, and now includes the administrative and operational activities associated with mechanical engineering, stores, purchasing and some facets of bridge construction. Specialist groups, such as the linemarkers and the traffic signal maintenance group, also operate from Glen Waverley.

Glen Waverley is the site for regular CRB auctions of roadmaking equipment — in fact, the biggest auctions of such equipment in Victoria! The last auction was held on Tuesday 18 November 1980, with items ranging from chain saws to bulldozers being up for sale.

SAFETY: an eye - catching subject

Next to our backs and limbs, eyes take more abuse than any other part of our body in a work situation.

Between January and September this year, almost 150 eye injuries were reported within the Board. And, of these, just under half occurred outdoors to staff on field duty.

The Safe Working Practices Committee is concerned about the incidence of eye injuries among CRB staff; they want you to be concerned, too.

Most eye injuries happen when foreign bodies such as dust, metal, concrete or stone enter the eye. In nearly all cases, the injury would have been avoided if the worker had been wearing some form of eye protection.

So it's the importance of eye protection that the Committee want to stress!

Everybody has a role to play in keeping eye injuries to a minimum: workers should wear eye protection, such as goggles, whenever necessary, and supervisors should make sure that eye protection is available for immediate use.



Those athletic CRB personnel who spend their lunchtimes jogging about, preparing for this or that marathon, are in training, right? Well, staff at Kew have more right to 'train' than most people because Head Office was built on the site of the old Kew Railway Station.

The construction of a railway line between Hawthorn and Kew was authorised in 1884, and the contract was let two years later. The line was operational soon after and, in 1922, it was electrified. However, by 1952, the line was considered unnecessary and the service ceased. In August of that year, the last passenger train ran between Hawthorn and Kew; a Departmental bus service was then provided for passenger travel requirements. In 1959 the Kew Station building was demolished.

By 1960, the former Barker Station had been demolished and replaced by a motel and, in 1961, the CRB offices were opened on the site of the former Kew Railway Station.

The 'Cutting', where HO staff now park their cars, was originally made for the railway line but it was left vacant when the tracks and overhead wires were removed.

Our photo, from 1959, shows one of the last trains to use the Hawthorn-Kew line crossing Barkers Road, and just about to enter the Cutting. It has been superimposed onto a recent photo, looking west along Barkers Road towards the city.

So if you hear a ghostly whistle or the faint sound of train wheels clattering along metal tracks as you make your way down the Cutting in the eerie half-light after work one night — don't worry!

It's probably just the Hawthorn-Kew Special making a last nostalgic run....
