




Work on our freeways takes place in many different locations — not just at ground level, but up in the air and under the ground as well!

New Telephones For Melbourne's Freeways





On the 28th December 1980 the Chairman, Mr T H Russell, announced that the CRB had extended the freeway emergency telephone network on the Tullamarine Freeway and the Calder Freeway (Niddrie Section).

Sixteen telephones have now been installed on the Tullamarine Freeway between the Bulla Road interchange and Melbourne (Tullamarine) Airport, and eight telephones on the Calder Freeway between the Essendon Airport and Erebus Street, Keilor Park.

In addition, the 20 telephones previously installed on the Tullamarine Freeway between Flemington Road and Bulla Road have been replaced with new handsets.

The CRB took this opportunity to install telephones that were suitable for use by disabled persons.

The new telephones are lower and, where necessary, closer to the guardrail so that they can be easily reached.

The cost of the additional telephones and replacement units together with associated equipment was \$360,000.

The CRB provides a free emergency telephone service and assistance to drivers of immobilised vehicles on seven major metropolitan traffic routes—Calder Freeway, Eastern Freeway, Kings Bridge-Queens Way, Mulgrave Freeway/South Gippsland Freeway, South Eastern Freeway, Tullamarine Freeway and West Gate Freeway.

During the 1979/80 financial year 11,919 calls were received by the CRB's emergency service centre from drivers of immobilised vehicles on these routes.

Route E6 Environment Effects Statement Completed

The CRB Chairman, Mr T H Russell announced on the 28th November 1980 that the CRB had completed the preparation of an environment effects statement for Route E6 between the Eastern Freeway and Harp Road, Kew and forwarded the statement to the Ministry for Conservation for assessment.

The Environment Effects Statement has been prepared in accordance with the guidelines laid down by the Ministry for Conservation and the Environment Effects Act 1978

The Statement examines eight alternative road proposals for a link between the Eastern Freeway and Harp Road and, following a detailed assessment of all relevant issues, the Board favours the alternative comprising a new four lane divided road which would retain the existing adjacent streets as service roads. This proposal is known as Alternative 5A.

This favoured alternative would improve traffic flow, maintain access to and from the local area, and complement the existing adjacent residential area.

The estimated cost of this alternative is \$5.5 million.

The Ministry for Conservation has arranged for the public


exhibition of the Statement so that interested members of the public can read the Statement and submit any comments to the Ministry.

The Statement is currently on exhibition during normal office hours until the 27th February, 1981 at the following locations:

- Ministry for Conservation Library
- CRB Library
- Kew Municipal Library
- Victorian State LibraryKew Municipal Offices
- CRB Environmental Studies Section

Following the exhibition of the Statement, the Ministry for Conservation will assess the Statement and, after taking into account comments from the general public, report to the appropriate State Government Ministers.

This report will then be taken into account by the Government before a decision is made.



BERWICK BYPASS PROJECT

Preliminary work being carried out by the Country Roads Board for the Berwick Bypass Project is well advanced.

Two large culverts to carry the freeway across the Berwick Town Drain and the Casey Airfield Drain are under construction. A large service culvert for a new State Rivers & Water Supply Commission pipeline near Beaconsfield has been completed.


The Minister of Transport, the Honourable Robert MacIellan,

MLA, has approved the CRB letting a \$617,482 earthworks contract to Dozer and Equipment Hire Company.

The contract involves the placement of approximately 300,000 cubic metres of fill material on the bypass, mainly in the area adjacent to the Casey Airfield.

The Berwick Bypass Project is estimated to cost \$14 million at 1980 prices and is scheduled for completion in 1983.


IN MEMORIAM

He lists his sole recreational interest as: Cliffhanging, would you believe?





Remember when ice cream was a home-made treat full of goodies like milk, eggs and sugar? Well, today's packaged ice cream from your supermarket freezer seems to be more 'trick' than 'treat'.

As additives don't need to be listed, most ice creams currently on sale are synthetic from start to finish. Analysis has shown the following:

DIETHYL GLUCOL -

a cheap chemical used as an emulsifier instead of eggs. Diethyl glucol is the same chemical used in anti-freeze and in paint removers.

PIPERNOAL

used in place of vanilla. This is the chemical used to kill lice.

ALDEHYDE C 17

used to flavour cherry ice cream. It is an inflammable liquid which is also used in anilene dyes, plastic and rubber.

ETHYL ACETATE

used to give ice cream a pineapple flavour. It is also used as a cleaner for leather and textiles and its vapours have been known to cause chronic lung, liver and heart damage.

AMYL ACETATE

used for its banana flavour. It is also used as an oil solvent.

BENZYL ACETATE -

used for its strawberry flavour. It is a nitrate solvent.

Colour additives and sugar substitutes are derived from coal products that destroy body cells, upset digestion, clog your system and dull your intellect.

Depressed? Well, if you still crave ice cream, take heart — there is an alternative. Délicious home-made ice cream need not be a thing of the past, and with that in mind, we present the following 'guaranteed-to-be-good-for-you' ice cream recipe!

HOME MADE ICE CREAM

1 tin carnation milk (refrigerate for several hours)

125g Philadelphia cream cheese (room temperature)

3 teaspoons PURE vanilla extract (Health Food Stores)

2/3 cup castor sugar

2 level teaspoons gelatine

2 tablespoons cold water

Beat together cheese, sugar and vanilla until soft and creamy. Dissolve gelatine in water, and stand for a few minutes. Stir over low heat until dissolved. Cool, beat well into cheese mixture. Beat milk until thick, add slowly to cheese mixture. Beat well.

NOTE: Makes almost 2 litres, and remains deliciously creamy. You should be able to vary this basic recipe by adding pureed fruit. It may be necessary to increase gelatine.





All over the state—in offices, depots, project sites and under tables— CRB staff celebrated the Christmas/New Year period in true fervour.


Files were bundled into pigeon holes, hard hats and safety jackets stayed in the lockers, and the champagne flowed freely.

The Army move in


Earlier last year, our Ballarat Division was required to widen and redeck the bluestone bridge over Mt Emu Creek at Skipton, about 50km west of Ballarat. It was considered impractical for traffic to continue to use the bridge, which forms part of the Glenelg Highway, during the three month renovation. A temporary bridge was needed alongside to carry highway traffic.

To assist the CRB, and provide valuable training for the Army Reserve, the Royal Australian Engineers 22nd Construction Regiment set about erecting the temporary structure. In August 1980, 30 part time soldiers (including one woman) constructed a 67 metre three-span Bailey bridge, weighing some 50 tonnes, in a little under ten hours.

Local residents, observing the construction of the bridge, were impressed by the soldiers' skills in transforming the various stacks of girders, panels, transoms, pins and clamps into a structure strong enough to carry highway traffic.

As well as supplying the materials for the Bailey bridge, Ballarat Division also prepared the site and erected the substructure.

The army, and the army reserve, are often called upon to help out with civilian work such as the construction of bridges, demolition and other engineering tasks. And the successful erection of this Bailey bridge certainly shows the advantage of using the skills of service personnel for community benefit in peacetime training.








