# MULGRAVE FREEWAY OPENING

A freeway from Chadstone to Hampton Park is available to motorists now that the final section of the Mulgrave Freeway has been opened.

On Wednesday 24th June, Victoria's Minister of Transport, the Honourable Robert Maclellan, MLA, opened the 1.6km section, which extends from Huntingdale Road, Oakleigh East to Warrigal Road, Chadstone and was built at a cost of \$11 million.

"The Mulgrave Freeway — South Gippsland Freeway route from Chadstone to Hampton Park now extends for a distance of 25km", Mr Maclellan said at the opening.

The Mulgrave Freeway is the longest section of freeway in the metropolitan area; the Tullamarine Freeway is next at 20.9kms.

The total construction cost of the Mulgrave and South Gippsland Freeways was \$56 million. The two freeways involved the construction of 40 bridges, two pedestrian overpasses and seven major

The official opening of the Mulgrave Freeway took place one week after the 20th anniversary of the opening of Victoria's first freeway, the Maltby Bypass Road near Werribee, which was opened on 16th June 1961.



The Maltby Bypass Road was named after Sir Thomas Maltby who was Victoria's Minister of Public Works from 1955 to 1961.

The Hon. Robert MacIellan, MLA, the Minister of Transport, is driven through a ribbon at the official opening in a Holden EK sedan. The car registered only 38,089 miles on the speedo.

# "SHARED RIDE" TAXI SCHEME ANNOUNCED

Transport Minister, the Honourable Robert Maclellan, MLA, announced a scheme on 4th August, 1981, to encourage local passenger services for country towns which have limited public transport.

BY TRANSPORT MINISTER

Mr Maclellan said "the scheme will subsidise the operation of a taxi for up to three hours per day for two days each week. The service will operate on either a fixed route or demand-response basis under an arrangement with the local municipal council".

The Minister added that councils will be responsible for the operation of the service, setting fares and directing the vehicle to best meet the needs of local residents.

Funds have been set aside to subsidise each council up to a maximum of \$1,250 per annum, per town. Municipalities will be responsible for any balance of operating costs in excess of the fares collected.

The 4 lane, 6½ mile divided highway cost £950,000 to

Mr Maclellan said "Municipalities have been informed of the scheme and, depending on the response, I intend to fund a number of pilot services for 12 months from 1st September, to test the effectiveness of the proposal".

The overall scheme will be administered by the Transport Regulation

# Municipal Allocations

The Board has allocated \$96,486,000 to Victoria's 212 municipal councils for roadworks in 1981/82.

The Minister of Transport, the Honourable Robert Maclellan, MLA, made the announcement on 24th May 1981.

"Despite an increase of \$6,414,000 over the 1980/81 allocation of \$90,072,000, there is a general shortage of funds for roads, and the increased allocations are not sufficient to offset the increased costs of road construction and maintenance," Mr Maclellan said.


The Minister also announced provisional allocations to

municipal councils for the next two financial years.

For 1982/1983 and 1983/84, the CRB has made provisional allocations totalling \$187,465,000 as part of the new three year rolling programme for the allocation of funds for road and bridge works.

Mr MacIellan said "Victoria is the first State to introduce such a rolling programme of allocations. The new system has been introduced with the aim of assisting municipal councils with the planning and programming of future works."



As yet, no particular sporting activities have been determined—the Division wants to see what sort of feedback it gets before making any final decisions.


In other words, if 50 keen dart enthusiasts or 20 to 30 ardent skydivers want to compete on the day, then every endeavour will be made to have the facilities provided.

Further east, at Traralgon Division, Divisional Engineer David Currie is sitting on a comfortable 68, only two points behind the leading tipster.





Victoria's freeway network has grown considerably since June, 1961. That was when the state's first freeway—the Maltby by-pass—was opened to traffic.


Today Victoria has more than 353km of freeways. Some of the more significant—and interesting—developments in the growth of the freeway system are seen in this special pictorial.





The 40 Hour Famine is a fund raising programme designed to give financial support to World Vision's relief and community self-help projects.



The efforts of those above raised \$539.80 — money which will help support two families for a full year — until the 40 Hour Famine in 1982.


# Staff Visit West Gate

# THE ARTERIAL ROAD EXTENSION OF THE EASTERN FREEWAY

The project will be constructed as a four lane, divided arterial road 2.7km long, and will provide a direct connection from the Eastern Freeway at Bulleen Road to Doncaster Road, North Balwyn.

Part of the project involves relocating Koonung Creek to allow the passage of flood waters: this will be achieved by an underground conduit scheme.

Project staff are also involved in the widening and reconstruction of the Doncaster Road/High Street intersection.

It is expected that the roadworks will be completed in mid 1982, and the undergrounding of the creek in late 1982.



So she is quite familiar with tin-shakes, raffles, fund-raising dances, pesky newspaper reporters and the many other elements associated with the pageant scene.


Terri was asked by the Social Club in early June if she would represent the CRB in the Quest.
